


Dean and President Candidate Profile

Seminary of the Southwest forms people for vocations of ministry, service, and healing- a mission rooted in the reconciling ministry of Christ. Critical components of our mission include the forming of Episcopal priests who will lead the work of the church into the future and of mental health counselors who will work for healing in the communities they serve, the continued development of

- Navigate fast-changing landscapes in theological and counseling education, and creatively anticipate challenges and opportunities.
- Ensure the maintenance of full accreditation status by means of ongoing and institution- wide evaluation and assessment.
- Develop and expand relationships within and beyond the church, the academy, and the professional counseling community.
- Foster and grow the Master of Divinity and Master of Clinical Mental Health Counseling degree programs and the other theological degree programs.
- Support the Iona Collaborative to address the needs of local formation and small churches throughout and beyond The Episcopal Church.
- Challenge the seminary to grow in its reflection of, and relevance to, underrepresented populations and constituencies, with special attention to enhancing the Latinx programs.

Established in 1952 by the Rt. Rev. John Elbridge Hines, the fourth Bishop of Texas and eventual Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church, Seminary of the Southwest was born from the need to educate more Episcopal priests during a period of rapid postwar growth in The Episcopal Church. Bishop Hines' vision was expansive: he sought to create a seminary for "the whole church … centered around dialogue between the Christian faith and culture."

As one of nine theological seminaries in The Episcopal Church, Seminary of the Southwest offers a three-year, residential Master of Divinity degree, and is made unique among its peers by its Master of Clinical Mental Health Counseling degree and commitment to local formation through the Iona Collaborative.

Located in the center of Austin, TX, Southwest offers a tranquil campus with modern facilities in the heart of a vibrant city. Shaded by the huge, stately live oak trees that are an icon of Austin and occupying a single city block on the north edge of the University of Texas campus, Seminary of the Southwest provides both the advantages of a close, familiar community and those of a world-class city.

Seminary of the Southwest stands boldly at this intersection of tradition and innovation. Rooted in the celebration of the theology, liturgy, and rich history of The Episcopal Church, Southwest lives within the fertile conversation among the creative solutions and powerful opportunities that will help the church thrive for generations.

KEY FACTS

- Since 2018, incoming MDiv and DAS students represent 38 different dioceses in the Episcopal Church.
- Our 1,500+ graduates are serving in all 50 states, in countries around the world, including 22 Bishops serving in the Episcopal Church and Anglican Communion.
- Seminary of the Southwest has an endowment of \$44 million which allows for an affordable education for future clergy, chaplains and counselors.
- Southwest <u>recently completed construction of the Bishop Dena A. Harrison Library and new</u> <u>Learning Complex</u>. This \$23.7 million project - funded by more than 600 donors - is a stateof-the-art teaching facility that stands alone in theological education.
- For more than four decades Seminary of the Southwest has been committed to Latino/Hispanic studies as part of its curriculum in multiple degree programs. Learn more here.
- Seminary of the Southwest is in year four of a five-year strategic plan based on four areas of focus: Beloved Community, Resourced and Resilient, Formation and Teaching, and Community Treasure. <u>Learn more here</u>.
- Seminary of the Southwest has a rich tradition and emphasis on writing, expression, and the
 arts. The <u>Center for Writing and the Arts</u> centers our student community on these important
 academic and expressive values, and the Southwest's on-line offering, <u>Open Book</u>, houses
 weekly faculty blog writing, Advent reflections from our community, and the many areas of
 expression that are a key characteristic of Southwest.
- The CACREP accreditation of the Master of Arts in Clinical Mental Health Counseling degree is unique in Central Texas, and allows graduates of Southwest to work within the VA health-care system and transfer their license across several states.
- The <u>Iona Collaborative</u> supports the vocations of locally formed priests, deacons, and lay ministers in 34 U.S. dioceses and global partners in Latin America:

STRATEGIC PLAN

STRENGTH TO STRENGTH:

INNOVATIVE EXCELLENCE FOR MINISTRY, SERVICE, AND HEALING

In May, 2021, the Seminary of the Southwest Board of Trustees adopted a new strategic plan. This plan aimed to reflect Southwest's emerging identity as a seminary of innovation and excellence, while maintaining the tradition and core values that have served the institution for generations.

Covering five years of operations but with visionary outcomes a decade into the future, the plan revised the mission and vision statement, created four areas of focus, and provides a detailed playbook for Seminary of the Southwest to fulfill its ever-increasing potential amid this next season of growth. Concluding in at the end of the 2024-25 Academic Year, the visionary outcomes and measurable goals are largely on track.

Four Areas of Focus (Pillars): he work of the strategic plan is divided into our distinct areas of focus, referred to in the plan as 'pillars':

BELOVED COMMUNITY



Creating a community that values and welcomes diversity and different perspectives, Southwest continues to work toward increased diversity in academic instruction and student body, enhanced diversity within institutional staffing and operations, increased communication and story-telling about its commitment to diversity and inclusion.

RESOURCED AND RESILIENT



Nurturing the fiscal resources necessary to fulfill our mission and withstand challenges, Southwest has begun fundraising with a target of growing the endowment to \$50 million, has increased Annual Fund revenue by 5% annually, retired long-term debt, increased significantly the living expenses it can provide for students, and completed construction of the Harrison Library and new Learning Complex.

FORMATION AND TEACHING



Developing and maintaining the highest curricular standards and pedagogy in our fields, the seminary has created a new MDiv Curriculum, diversified the MDiv Student Body, build a national reputation for the MHC degree, and integrated the Iona Collaborative into Southwest with new and expanded offerings.

COMMUNITY TREASURE



Becoming a resource in our greater community to convene, gather, and host critical conversations, the seminary has engaged with key audiences, ensured strategic alignment with hosted events, refined the identity of the Center for Writing and the Arts, and launched a dynamic new digital presence and brand.



CAMPUS AND FACILITIES

THE BISHOP DENA A. HARRISON LIBRARY AND NEW LEARNING COMPLEX

In September of 2023, Seminary of the Southwest opened the Bishop Dena A. Harrison Library and new Learning Complex. A complete reconstruction of the previously existing library and classroom building, the new facilities are the culmination of work that began in 2016 with the creation of a comprehensive Campus Master Plan. This work informed a feasibility study and subsequent capital campaign that raised the funds to build the \$23.6 million dollar project. The visionary and indefatigable work of the Southwest leadership, faculty, and staff – much of it amidst the pandemic – culminated in the unveiling of a new transformational facility which began hosting classes at the beginning of the Fall 2023 semester.

The new buildings feature state-of-the-art pedagogical technology and design throughout, and add to Southwest's already thoughtfully constructed campus. In addition to housing Southwest's Booher Collection, the Harrison Library is now the home of Library Administration, Southwest's Center for Writing and the Arts, the Information Technology Services department, several flexible gathering and study spaces, and two professional level recording studios. The Learning Complex is home to four new classroom spaces (including a Learning Chapel), the student bookstore, a counseling practicum room, and the Iona Collaborative. At the heart of the project is Trinity Crossing, an inspired re-imagining of the unique space created by the relationship of the new buildings on the Southwest campus.

CHRIST CHAPEL

At the center of worship and theological formation on campus is Christ Chapel. Built in 1962 and designed by architect Arthur Fehr, Christ Chapel features an entire wall of windows on one side, a Holt Kamp organ, and floor-to-ceiling hand-blown stained glass windows. Through the East facing window, you can see the Chapel cross, intentionally placed outside to remind our students that their ministries are not bound within the walls of any building.

MCDONALD BUILDING AND WEEKS CENTER

Named for Dean Emeritus the Very Rev. Dusty McDonald, the McDonald Building houses 6 classrooms of varying size, and faculty offices. The Weeks Center is home to a variety of campus life, with lectures in Knapp Auditorium, community meals in Howell Dining Hall (supported by a full-scale catering kitchen), and gatherings in Maddux Lounge.

RATHER HOUSE

Built in 1911, this Spanish Renaissance revival house was the original home of the family that donated the land for the Seminary of the Southwest campus. It was renovated and modernized in 2008 and now is the main administrative offices for the seminary.
